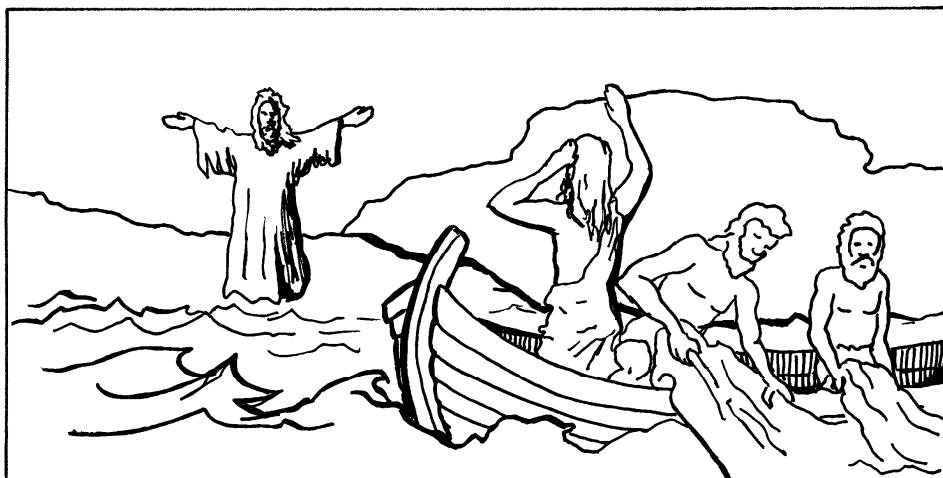

ST. ANSELM

For anyone disheartened at how easily contemporary discussions of disputed Church-State issues escalate from civil discourse to shrill polemic, Anselm provides perspective.

Grounded in the Benedictine Rule's balanced "prayer and work," this monk-scholar was called from his Abbey to become Archbishop of Canterbury and thrust into firestorms of political intrigue, becoming himself the target of warring bishops and nobles, kings and popes.

Yet from depths of inner peace, Anselm wrote this moving exhortation by which today's *Liturgy of the Hours* celebrates him: "Rise up, insignificant man! From your preoccupations, flee a while. From your turbulent thoughts, hide for a time. Your crushing responsibilities cast aside. Your burdensome business lay down. Free a little space for God. Rest a little while in him!"

"Faith seeking understanding" was his strikingly contemporary motto; and though renowned as a learned philosopher-theologian, Anselm also left personal letters, profound for their insights on Christian friendship. Along with those, he composed "A Prayer for My Friends" and "A Prayer for My Enemies," reminding us that those who love God most passionately are also those who love others most humanly.

A Change Of Focus

At times one would like to recapture the spirit of the apostles and of the martyrs in the early Christian communities following the adage of Acts 5:29-32 when Peter says: "We must obey God rather than men. The God of our ancestors raised Jesus, though you had him killed by hanging him on a tree. God exalted him at his right hand as leader and savior to grant Israel repentance and forgiveness of sins. We are witnesses of these things, as is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him."

After receiving the Holy Spirit there was no hesitation or doubt in the apostles' mind as to the way to follow to give reason or an account of the hope they carried in their life, the hope of eternal life in God, hope obtained in the paschal mystery.

In times of challenges it is very easy to think according to human ways and to put aside the possibilities that God has in store for us, in other words, to put in second place God's ways. These ways are as far from ours as the sky is from the earth as the Scriptures tell us (see Is.55:8). Nonetheless, these are the ways leading to fulfillment and to realization. They were so in the life of the disciples, who experienced many persecutions, floggings and underwent also martyrdom yet kept on speaking in the name of Jesus Christ the Risen Lord, through their lives and through their deaths. The disciples knew that the Lord would not abandon them and would be with them until the end of time (see Mt.28:20).

When we look back, reflect and compare their experience to ours, we should not be overwhelmed by a door that suddenly shuts in front of our eyes and become blind, unable to see that when we do our best the Lord is going to take care of the rest and possibly help us see that two doors are going to be opened for us.

Inspired by the early Christian communities' spirit, a shift of focus is often needed, a conversion from my own ways to God's ways for my life. May the saints and the martyrs of the early Church inspire us through their faith, commitment and sense of vision. A blessed Easter Season.

Social Concerns: A Tale Of Two Steves

Steve Jobs recently appeared at a news conference with Governor Schwarzenegger promoting life by advocating for organ donations. Why would Steve Jobs, CEO of one of the most successful companies in the world, spend his limited time doing this? See the end of this article.

Once upon a time, there was a chemist named Steve Moore. Steve and I developed a friendship and a strong common bond working together on chemical safety 10-15 years ago. Steve was an R&D Technical Manager for a Fortune 500 company and I was the R&D Environmental Health and Safety (EH&S) Manager

EH&S is often thought of as one of those programs that is a "non-value added" activity – with potential regulatory consequences, but grossly underestimated on the personal impact level. Many companies just do enough to "pass audits" and too many young chemists think they "know it all". I was fortunate to have Steve as a strong and passionate advocate for chemical safety at the management level. For us, safety was real and we "did good" - Steve was a major reason for that.

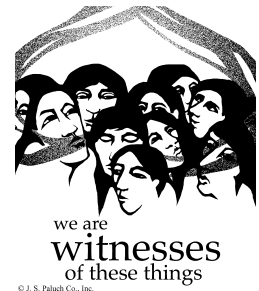
I wondered why he was as passionate as he was, and one day I asked him.

He shared that he had a significant medical situation because of being exposed to chemical hazards as a graduate student and did not want others to experience the same thing.

Steve passed away last week from leukemia – it is not clear whether or not this was related to chemical exposures, but there is no evidence to suggest it was. We could speculate that chemical safety will never be the same without Steve, but perhaps that is going a bit too far. In reality, there are dozens and dozens of younger chemists who worked for and with Steve, and they "got the message" and will carry on in his absence. He taught them well and they remember ... and isn't this part of the definition of "living forever"?

... back to Steve Jobs: Steve Jobs would not be with us today if he had not had a liver transplant last year and so we can see that – just like for Steve Moore – a passion for justice is often experiential and personal.

Saint (Mother) Teresa of Calcutta once said – "To find what you should be doing, just look in front of you". What is right in front of YOU is just waiting to be "seen"?

Do we genuinely give honor to the name of Jesus by being his namesakes in the world today?

Earth's Stewardship



In his World Day of Peace message, Pope Benedict focused on the care of Creation, calling on leaders to respond "to the great ecological challenge"

presented by the climate crisis. He also expressed disappointment of the "political resistance to combating the degradation of the environment."

The U.S. conference of Catholic Bishops has also declared "at its core, global climate change...is about the future of God's creation and the one human family. It is about protecting both the human environment and the natural environment."

In Genesis, as God created all the elements of our earth and sky, He proclaimed them "good." He also gave stewardship of the earth and all creatures to Adam, and thus to each of us. In Celtic Spirituality, there is an understanding that the world belongs to God and is sacred because it is created by God. Earth and heaven, nature and grace, the visible and the invisible belong together.

Each of us is not powerless: in our homes, gardens, neighborhoods, we can make small concrete changes that will protect creation for future generations. Conserving paper, recycling waste, planting trees and gardens, walking instead of driving, buying energy-efficient appliances are only some of the ways we can make a difference.

Stopping "to smell the roses" is more about appreciating creation and each other than it is about roses. In nature we often rediscover our relationship with God, whose presence is found at the heart of creation. Our faith, morality and spirituality call for active participation in preserving God's creation for ourselves and, especially for posterity. We owe them a healthy and cared-for legacy.
