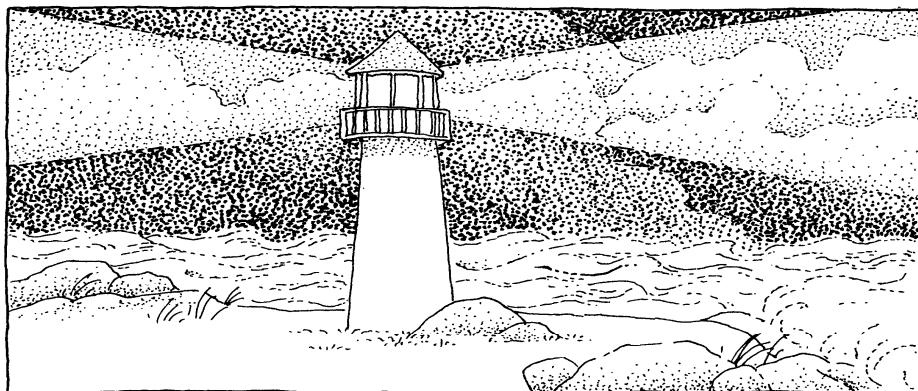

Feast Days - Peter Scagnelli

Feast of Saint Catherine of Siena ~ April 29 (1347-1380)

Imagine the pope receiving a young woman still in her twenties who addresses him as "my sweet Christ on earth," then orders: "Get back to Rome where you belong!" Amazingly, Gregory XI complied! Yet this was but one astonishing incident in the extraordinary life of Catherine of Siena, a truly unique medieval woman.

Youngest of twenty-five children, Catherine refused marriage and became a Dominican Tertiary at sixteen, cloistering herself at home in contemplative prayer, austere penances, and mystical experiences, culminating in "spiritual espousal" to Christ. Then, incarnating the Dominican ideal of "passing on to others the fruits of contemplation," Catherine left her solitude to care for the poor, nurse the sick, comfort the dying, and bury the dead.

Increasingly renowned for converting souls and healing bodies, she was sought after to broker peace during civil wars and Church schisms. All this, and like Jesus, whom she called "my "Divine Spouse," she died at thirty-three! Four hundred letters and her spiritual classic *The Dialogue* inspired Paul VI to name her, together with Teresa of Ávila, the first women "doctors of the Church."

After prayerful consideration and discernment with my spiritual director, with my mentor and, after consultation with the bishop of San Jose, I have decided to step down from the office of Pastor of St. Clare parish as of July 1st, 2010.

Almost a year ago I was asked by the bishop to take up this position of ministry as pastor and accepted it in view of service to God's people. Over the past nine months, though, I have found the administrative part of being Pastor burdensome.

I believe I could serve God's people better in a different capacity as Parochial Vicar in a parish in the diocese of San Jose.

Thank you for your understanding of this difficult decision of mine: I ask for your prayers as I await reassignment to another parish. Again, thank you for your support and for your help in this time of transition. I am sure the Lord will provide for this special Catholic community of faith.

Prayers Of "Thank You"

Leaving Mass most Sundays, we typically experience one or more of a wide range of emotions or reactions: direction for our week ahead, insight into a personal struggle, joy at seeing our friends in the community, challenge for the ways we treat others or might better serve those in need, excitement for coming parish activities, inspiration to seek and share God's love.

If we are honest, we might also admit that sometimes we leave Church bored or distracted by the anxiety of our world. Rarely do we leave Church stunned. Yet I imagine this was the most prevalent of reactions last Sunday when Fr. Paolo announced his resignation as Pastor, effective at the end of June.

In my experience, people react so differently when stunned. Some are filled with a million questions as they try to sort through what is happening and how it will affect their lives. Others might feel guilty about how they could have prevented this pain. Others might feel sorrow, regret, and possibly anger. Such is how we deal with loss. In times of loss and stunning, we turn to prayer and this I encourage us all to do in the months ahead.

It is said that all prayer reduces to these two expressions: please and thank you. Here, then, on behalf of the Pastoral Council, are some prayers we offer at this time.

Thank you for the care Fr. Paolo showed our community. Fr. Paolo was present. He came to events. He listened to our suggestions and our problems. He supported our community and made special efforts to be at parish events, large or small. He showed great interest in changing things for the better. As one Council member said, "he was like family" and in the words of a long-time parishioner, "Fr. Paolo is a great priest."

Please allow Fr. Paolo to find peace and health in his future priestly work. Please guide and support our community in this time of transition.

Finally, I would like to share one of my first encounters with Fr. Paolo. I told him that I heard great things about him from my students who came from his previous parish. He said, "Only God is great." We pray, above all, in confidence that this great God will continue to work with and through this most humble priest as well as within our unique and special community.

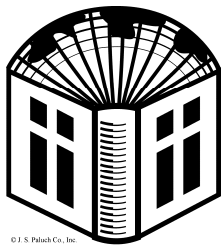
Pastoral Council Nominations

Who Are We?



Who are “we” today as we sing “We are his people, the sheep of his flock” in the responsorial psalm? It is very easy to think that it is just us, at this Mass, or just the members of this parish or diocese, or perhaps we are thinking it is all Roman Catholics in the United States. But “we” are much larger and broader than that.

If you take a globe or atlas in your hand, it would be difficult to point to any place on land where “we” aren’t singing this psalm today. Not only that, but “we” are the saints who survived the great time of trial, as described in Revelation’s reading today. And “we” continue to grow not just in numbers but in complexity and diversity as the work begun by Paul and Barnabas in today’s first reading continues.

But, even though who “we” are, the flock of the Lord, is almost beyond our ability to comprehend, we all hear the voice of Jesus Christ, our one and only shepherd, as we continue through the Easter season to follow him faithfully.

“My Sheep Hear My Voice”

The Gospel reading today from John is quite short but we immediately get the shepherd and sheep theme. We recall how we have often heard of Jesus as the Good Shepherd and may remember seeing pictures of Jesus surrounded by sheep, holding a little lamb. Those stories and pictures exude a sense of comfort and peace.

But the job of tending sheep was hard and dangerous work, and the sheep tended to stray. The crook of the shepherd’s staff saved many a sheep but it was the voice of the shepherd that kept the flock together. Hearing the shepherd talk to them, sing to them, scold or warn them helped the sheep stay near by. The shepherd’s voice guided them to follow closely when the flock moved to a different hillside in search of food and water.

How is this applicable to us today? Jesus, our Good Shepherd, loves us, knows us, continually talks to us in various ways. If we truly listen and hear his voice, we follow him and want to do what’s right. We do not perish but attain eternal life. And yet, when we stray and do not listen, he calls us back over and over. He is in control and, as Jesus and the Father are one, Jesus emphasizes that no one can take us away from him, from his or his Father’s hand.

If we do get lost, it’s our mistake, due to the choices we make and the paths we take.

In this Gospel we are invited to listen to the Good Shepherd, to trust and believe even when the challenges of life overwhelm us. Peter and Paul followed the voice of Jesus in spite of the suffering that was in front of them.

As priests are like shepherds for us, let us pray today for our priests:

“Jesus, bless our priests that they may shepherd us well and help us grow closer to God by their good example. Amen.”

“O Shepherd of Israel, hear us.

O Shepherd of all shepherds, guide and strengthen our Holy Father, that he may always shepherd your flock in the image of Christ.

O Shepherd of all shepherds, inspire our local bishops, that they may lead your people safely with nothing to fear.

O Shepherd of all shepherds, be with our local pastors, that they may care for the lost.”

Hope At Easter

We are only four weeks into the Easter season, so it is not too late to speak of Easter. Recently I came upon an editorial by Fr. Tom Kiggins, a St. Patrick father, which I’m reprinting from the April edition of “Africa,” because it’s too good not to share with you.

“In Greek mythology, Pandora was given a box or jar by Zeus (God) and warned not to open it. Alas, she did not heed him and out poured all the ills of humanity. However the last thing left in the box was something good. It was hope.

One could be forgiven for thinking that Pandora has recently reopened her box and found it newly stocked with various ills like greed, climate change, child abuse, floods, famines, murder, economic recession, earthquakes, to mention but a few. However, hope is there too.

Perhaps we can forget for a moment that evil is so pervasive and imagine a world of goodness. That is what Jesus did. He imagined a world, within the world, where evil did not hold sway. He called it the kingdom of God.

Signs of the kingdom are all around us. Where there is love or any of its fruits among people there is the kingdom. It is kingdom people who contribute to relief in Haiti or who volunteer to go there to help. It is kingdom people who look out for the old, the disabled, and the mentally ill. It is kingdom people who seek to right the wrongs of child abuse and who bind up the wounds of the victims. It is kingdom people who pray and who forgive. And in such people lies our hope, hope that what Jesus imagined is coming to pass and that we will be part of the kingdom for all eternity.

Easter is the great validation of the kingdom of God. Jesus, who imagined it, was put to death on Good Friday but rose again on Easter Sunday. Had he remained dead, his kingdom would have been mere fantasy. Because God raised him up he becomes the first fruits, a living and divine force working to bring about the kingdom. What better reason for hope can we have than to believe that the Risen Christ is working with us to bring about God’s plans for Creation?”
