From the Pastoral Council - Patrick Schneider, Chair

Future Direction And Planning

The Pastoral Council met last week to discuss the future direction of the Council. When the Pastoral Council was formed in 2004-2005, the first priority was to grow the Council from its original 5 members to 12 parishioners with a broad and extensive knowledge of the community—parishioners who were well known and trusted to invite, listen, and assess the major concerns and long term goals of the whole parish. The fruits of their work were made visible in the Pastoral Plan, finalized in the spring of 2008 and revised slightly based on feedback and lessons from the first year of implementation.

In its most recent meeting, the Pastoral Council realized that the

effectiveness of the Pastoral Plan requires the Pastoral Council to take a different shape—one that contains intimate knowledge of all the major areas of the Pastoral Plan.

The current Pastoral Council recognized many advantages to this more executive vision of the Council: a diversity of expertise and depth of knowledge; discussions that fully and immediately consider the ways in which any decision might affect the whole of the parish as well as the work of key committees; bringing to the front the most pressing topics while minimizing the need to constantly revisit the same issues; reliably and consistently drive the

She's A School Woman!

Recently, a police officer walked up to the school building and asked to see Sr. Ann Marie. Perplexed parents and staff tried to track her down, only later to realize that the police officer was a former student of Sr. Ann Marie's who simply wanted to touch base with her. The principal laughed, noting that it is a common occurrence for previous students to stop by to see Sr. Ann Marie, check on her, and share their lives with her. I thought it would be nice for our community to better know this special person, who has made such an impact on so many young lives through our parish school.

Born in Dubuque, Iowa, Sr. Ann Marie was the oldest of four children. Her father had been in the seminary, and had left to marry her mother. She grew up in a Catholic community (she fondly calls her Catholic ghetto) and attended Catholic schools. Growing up, she always wanted to teach. It was at her high school senior year retreat that she unexpectedly felt a calling from God to join the Sisters of

Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary (BVM).

Sr. Ann Marie's first mission, from 1970-1974, was at St. Gertrude in Stockton, teaching 1st grade. She then

moved to Illinois to be close to her ill father and continued to teach the 1st and 5th grades for 10 years. It was in 1984 that she returned to California as a teacher at St. Clare. Living in the convent here on campus, she taught the 6th grade for a year and then the 5th grade through 2007. Sr. Ann Marie then took a sabbatical year to rest after battling illness, but returned with the desire to offer her skills and experience as a mentor, coordinator of religious instruction, and this year, Assistant Principal.

Sr. Ann Marie said that she is still at St. Clare because she loves the

community. Over the years, she has seen many changes in administration, facilities, and even uniforms. She feels St. Clare is unique as it has continually become richer in diversity and culture. While always stressing academics, the school's foundation of faith builds character in the students and faculty and has enabled the community to grow and weather challenges.

It isn't a wonder that Sr. Ann Marie seems to have had an impact on her students over the years. She enjoys the life and spirit of the children, inviting them to think outside the box. Her message to her students has been consistent over time. *Celebrate life. Lean on your faith for strength. Laugh. Love. Be at peace and know when the spirit is challenging you. Do not be afraid to try new things. Never stop growing. Be the best you can be.*

The Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary have a term for those that share a natural gift of teaching and school administration. *She is a school woman.* We are blessed to have Sr. Ann Marie in our community as a teacher, a mentor, a spiritual leader, and a friend. We are blessed to have her as our school woman!

Pastoral Plan forward while simultaneously reviewing the Plan itself; require an expansion of the size of the Pastoral Council, thus allowing for greater participation from the parish; if an emergency meeting needed to be called, this Council would certainly provide thorough and informed guidance to a pastor; by focusing on the goals and objectives of the Pastoral Plan, the Council members would all the more direct its concern towards the stated goals of the whole parish.

We have identified parishioners to fill each of these roles and will publish their names next week after we have had time to notify all those nominated for the Pastoral Council. Here, then, are the areas represented in next year's Pastoral Council: Catechesis, Liturgy, Social Justice, Bereavement/Outreach, Youth, School Leadership, Finance, Facilities, Events/Community Building (English speaking), Events/Community Building (Portuguese speaking), Events/Community Building (Spanish speaking), Bulletin/Communications, Parish Heritage, Pastor, ex officio, Parochial Vicar, ex officio, Parish Administrator, ex officio.

As we approach Memorial Day our thoughts and our prayers go today to the brave men and women who sacrificed their lives during war time for the country so that we could experience the freedom that we have today. We pray not only for the repose of their souls but also that the memory of their life may not be lost forever but kept alive in our hearts and their families may be consoled and strengthened.

Inevitably the loss of a loved one brings sadness and grief, whether or not a person is up in age, suffering or reasonably healthy. It is not always easy to overcome these moments. People and families usually go through various phases in dealing with loss and grief as outlined in the Kübler-Ross grief cycle (and extended variations): (shock), denial, anger, bargaining depression, (testing) and acceptance.

Some people deal better with these moments and heal faster; others heal at a slower pace; still others never go through all of these moments and cannot go on in life with some kind of peace and serenity of heart.... There is no deadline or expectation in society to overcome loss by a predetermined time: people deal differently with grief. Some people carry a heavy load of sadness in their hearts for many years or for their entire life. It is helpful, if we are experiencing loss, to seek the support needed at a local level (i.e. Bereavement Committees, Grief Support Groups, Counselors, etc.) and especially ask ourselves where we are in this process and how we can go on in life with the assurance that our beloved departed brothers and sisters are at peace and/ or if we can be at peace.

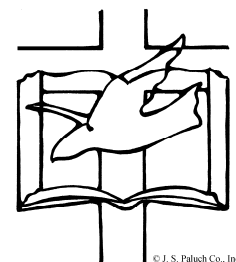
The upcoming solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity may help us find the right perspective in loss and in grief. As Catholics we sign ourselves with a special sign; we begin and end our day and every moment of prayer "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." We pray that our activities, events and lives may have in God their beginning and in God their fulfillment. We gather in the

name of our Creator, Who called us to life; in the name of our Redeemer, Jesus Christ, Who has given us hope in eternal life through the paschal mystery; in the name of the Lord, the Giver of Life, Who helps us to be here today, to seek and to love God with all of our heart, mind and strength, as we strive to serve our neighbor and to live our baptismal call to holiness in the perspective of eternal life.

The Most Holy Trinity solemnity, while focusing our attention and praise to our Triune God (One God in three distinct Persons), can also help us in our journey of life and of faith knowing that death is not the end of everything but that there is life, hope and love in God, the Source of all life, hope and love.

Wisdom Is The Window To Right Living

When the reading of the day doesn't introduce the speaker, I always have to backtrack some verses to get more context. Today the beginning of the chapter reveals that it is Wisdom herself who speaks from the book of Proverbs. More than a book of "advice" for Jewish communities, Proverbs continues to teach us about right living. It includes many themes like discipline, right judgment and even help for living in relationship with others.

Today Wisdom is speaking to the ignorant fools who do not listen or value what She has to say and teach. She begins by telling all that we should be attentive because of her importance and place with God. It is as if she is justifying her place in creation when she says that she was present before God created water, mountains, earth, skies, and shores. She claims to have participated in creation with God, "Then was I beside him as his craftsman, and I was his delight day by day."

Of course Genesis reminds us that at the end of God's act of creation, he saw that it was good. Wisdom too, found delight in the human race.

Listening to Wisdom vying to be a priority for those who hear her, we can ask ourselves about how we relate to Wisdom. Our culture increasingly cultivates on-demand and quick-fix expectations. As one student told me once "Wisdom? I'll get that when I am older." I should have had him read this passage! Is it true that we naturally get wiser, just as we naturally age? Today, Wisdom is calling out to each of us, young, old, mature in faith or newly initiated. Instead of waiting for Wisdom, what can we do to actively cultivate her presence and our growth?

Social Concerns: Preferential Option For The Poor

The *Mercury News* recently had an article by Patty Fisher in which she raised reader awareness of the consequences to the poor if proposals to close the state budget gap are implemented. It could have been a Catholic tutorial on "Rights" and the "Preferential Option for the Poor".

She noted that "basic services we once expected government to provide to all of us, regardless of our ability to pay, are increasingly available only to those who can afford them. Basics like food, shelter, child care, (and) a quality education."

Patty went on: "There is a pattern to (the) choices. (These proposals) would eliminate welfare altogether and cut child care for low-income families, in-home supportive services, MediCal and mental health. (These are) Programs established to help the neediest among us: the poor, sick and elderly."...and further: "What happens if we eliminate them? More single mothers and their children will be hungry. More mentally ill people will be in jail. More old people will be forced to move into nursing homes."

What is the point here? The point is not just the content of the article, but the fact that the article exists in the first place and was made possible through a structure within society called "newspapers". The future of newspapers is fragile. Once we took them for granted...but costs, consolidations, and electronic forms of communication have put them at risk. The presence of people like Patty, an ally in our never-ending quest to achieve the Kingdom of God on earth, is not assured.

The same could be said about investigative reporters – like those who recently successfully raised community issues about the racially disproportionate police enforcement of laws which unjustly "controlled" Hispanics to the benefit of downtown San Jose business interests. I call on all of you to strongly reflect on how much you value newspapers and their structural role in raising awareness and challenging our society to achieve good – and let your faith guide your actions.

Three In One: Trinity



The doctrine of the Trinity is one of the central dogmas (an authoritative, not to be disputed belief) in Christianity: one God yet three distinct "persons." St. Patrick gave his followers the shamrock to understand the Trinity, three leaves on one stem; yet, even here we are left with incomplete understanding.

Vatican Council acknowledged that the Trinity is a theological mystery. What that means is that the *truth* of the Trinity is known by Divine Revelation and, also, that even when revealed, the understanding is "hidden by the veil of faith and enveloped, so to speak, by a kind of darkness" (Constitution, "De fide. cath.", iv).

Perhaps *Magnificat* sheds a bit of



light: "Three Persons who are *one God* because the Father is love, the Son

is love, the Spirit is love. God is wholly and only love, the purest, infinite, and eternal love. He does not live in splendid solitude but rather is an inexhaustible source of life that is ceaselessly given and communicated. All things derive from love, aspire to love, and move impelled by love."
