Kathleen and I have a favorite saying: of all the things I've lost, it's my mind I miss the most. In the event that you have recently lost your mind or even if you were just out of town for Memorial Day, last weekend's front page story described the significant changes to the structure of the Pastoral Council.

Here's a synopsis. Originally, the Council aimed to have members who could represent the perspectives of the parish, listen carefully to parishioners' long-term hopes, and articulate a Pastoral Plan that was faithful to the hopes and dreams of the community. Once the Pastoral Plan was finalized,

Council members took responsibility for some area of the plan. What the current Council has discovered is that, with great work being done on so many areas of the Pastoral Plan, a new model of Council is needed: one that starts with people at work in the key areas of the Plan who can bring their expertise and experience to all the in-depth Pastoral Council discussions and recommendations.

The new, executive model for the Pastoral Council expands the number of parishioners able to serve on the

On Racism And Discrimination

The newspapers are characterizing more and more of the actions in society today as **racism** and **discrimination** starting with current and planned future actions against Hispanics related to the Arizona Immigration legislation. Next came the murder of Hispanic Luis Rodriguez in Shenandoah, PA by white "teens (who) taunted the undocumented worker with racial epithets, pummeled him to the ground and then kicked him in the head, court documents charge. He died in a hospital two days later."

The disturbing pattern continued at a recent Nebraska H.S. Championship soccer game. After the game, a basically all-white team (the winners) from Lincoln, and some of their supporters, chased after the other (60% Hispanic) team from Omaha throwing simulated copies of green cards into the air while taunting the Omaha Team. To passively note that this is an act against human dignity does not even come close to how I feel we should react to this outrage.

Which brings me to a recent *Mercury News* Op-Ed article by Leonard Pitts about a series on "Black or White: Kids on Race" on CNN. In one study "black children were presented by two dolls, similar in appearance except that one was dark and the other light. Asked which doll was bad, stupid or ugly, most of the

We Are “Eucharist” For Each Other

The first reading from Genesis briefly describes an encounter between Abram and the King of Salem, who brings out bread and wine in a ritual of blessing. The king, Melchizedek, blesses both Abram and God Most High. For the feast of Corpus Christi, the Church pulls away the unseemly sides to the story that explain the reason Abram was blessed and demonstrate the impact of his blessing. The context surrounding this story has great value.

The chapter begins with a victory for the enemies of Abram, whose nephew Lot was captured in the battle. Abram rallies a coalition of other nations (including Salem and Sodom) and with God’s help, defeats the armies that had pillaged the region and taken Lot hostage. Melchizedek’s blessing thus served as an act of celebration and gratitude—what the Greeks would call “Eucharist.”

Right after the blessing, the King of Sodom approached Abram with a deal: “I’ll keep the people we saved and you can keep the property.” Abram would have none of this unjust profit, refusing to benefit from war or give the King of Sodom any credit for Abram’s future wealth. Melchizedek’s blessing thus served as inspiration—what Vatican II called, “A faith that does justice.”

Jesus was a priest in the line of Melchizedek because, like Melchizedek, Jesus joyfully celebrated meals with friends, ultimately substituting the bread and wine with his own body and blood. Like Abram, we are called to demonstrate the blessing of Jesus’ sacrifice by leading lives of compassion and fighting for justice.

Whereas our first reading tells a little heard story, today’s Gospel recounts the familiar tale of the multiplication of the loaves. We can lose ourselves in the extraordinary and mysterious details of this story, so it is helpful to recall how consistently Jesus centered his life and ministry on meals. In his public life, Jesus ate with all manner of sinners. In his last days, he arranged and then celebrated a final meal with his apostles. When he rose from the dead, the disciples on the road to Emmaus recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread.

On the Feast of Corpus Christi, we do well to consider that Jesus’ signature habit was taking the bread, blessing the bread, breaking the bread, and giving the bread to others. We do not simply receive the Bread of Life. We are very much like the bread: taken into Jesus’ hands, blessed by God, broken, and then in our brokenness, shared with the world.

Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Some people like the alliterative sound of Corpus Christi (Latin for Body of Christ), which is the name this feast was known by for centuries. It has a nice ring to it but, if you *google* “Corpus Christ” you will be directed to the city of Corpus Christi, Texas, for the name is no more.

When the feast of Corpus Christi was first papally sanctioned in 1264, it was to honor the Eucharist, the actual body and blood of Christ under the form of bread alone. It was celebrated on the Thursday after the feast of the Trinity commemorating the institution of the Eucharist on Holy Thursday. There was also the feast of the Most Precious Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ celebrated on July 1st. In 1970, these feasts were combined and the feast was renamed Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.

In medieval times in many parts of Europe, the feast of Corpus Christi was a time for performing mystery plays, enactments from biblical stories. This has also been the day for processions, usually outdoors, where the Eucharist was processed in a monstrance with much pomp and pageantry. Processions are still held in many countries on this feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, along with Benediction and Veneration.

In another study, a 5-year old white girl (one of many boys and girls in the study, both black and white) was interviewed by a researcher as her mother sat out of sight. She was shown images (not dolls) of children whose color ran from very light to very dark. Asked to point out the 'good child', she touched the lighter skinned figure. 'Why is that the good child?' she was asked. "Because I think she looks like me", the little girl said.

Asked to point out the "bad child", she touched the darkest image on the paper. 'And why is that the bad child?' 'Because she's a lot darker", the little girl said. And watching, the mother softly wept. Should we weep? Should we act? If YES, how?
