

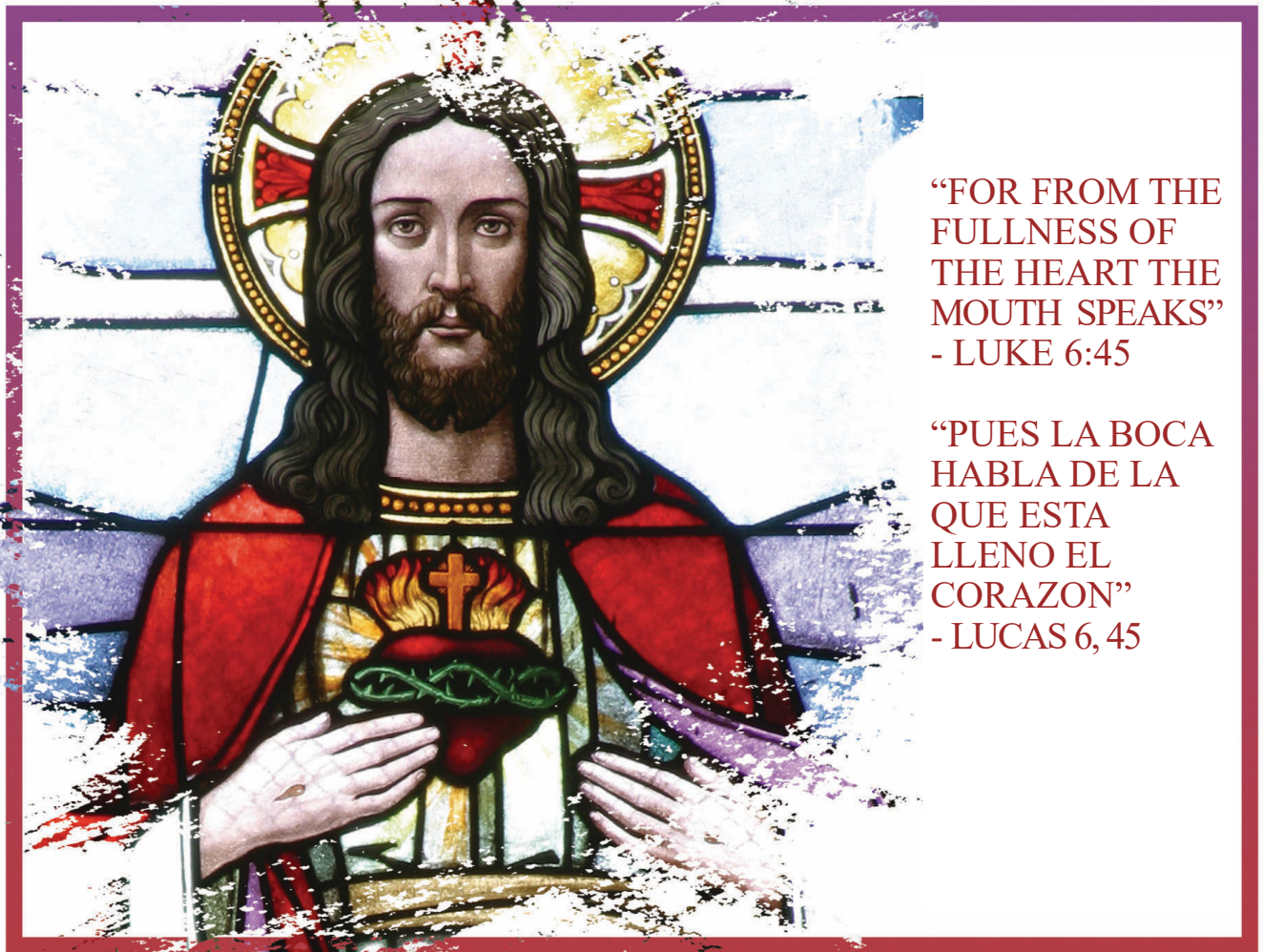

The gospel reading this weekend is contains a number of sayings of Jesus, primarily about vision (“Can a blind person guide a blind person? . . . Why do you notice the splinter in your brother’s eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own? You hypocrite! Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother’s eye”).

For Christians, vision/sight refers to the vision of faith, insight. “Walking by faith, and not by sight,” we seek to walk in the light, in the way of the Lord. Doing so allows us to guide others, since we are then children of the light, not of darkness.

As we move toward Lent, which begins this Wednesday, we have the luxury of six weeks to give extra attention to walking in the way of the Lord. During Lent, we will be called to works of prayer, penance and care for the poor.

I invite you and your families to be with us for our celebration of Ash Wednesday. Together let us hear the words of the Lord who calls us to the fullness of life.

Ashes will be blessed and imposed at the following times:



8:00 am Mass in English
10:45 am Liturgy of the Word (for our school)
in the Tent
12:10 pm Bilingual Mass
5:00 pm Mass in English
6:30 pm Mass in Spanish

For Ash Wednesday this year, we have been advised that we may return to the practice of imposing ashes on the forehead, as in the past. However, if anyone would be more comfortable having ashes sprinkled on the head, as we did last year, we just ask that when that person approaches the priest, they should bow their head. Then we will know that your choice is to have ashes sprinkled, rather than marking you on the forehead with ashes.

Collection: Aid to Churches in Eastern Europe

On Ash Wednesday, a collection is taken up to aid the Church in Eastern Europe. As of this writing, war is threatening to break out in this part of the world. We can be sure that the Catholic Church there will be in need of all the help others can give. Thank you for your generosity.

From Msgr. Fran, regarding Bishop Cantú's lifting of the general dispensation to participate in Sunday and Holy Day Masses. This appeared in the February 11 Friday Update:

As I have been anticipating for some time now, and alluded to often in these weekly updates, **the general dispensation from the obligation to celebrate Mass on Sundays and Holy Days is being withdrawn by Bishop Cantú, effective March 6, the First Sunday of Lent.** As he noted recently, we believe that we are the last diocese in our region to do so, most having already lifted the dispensation last summer.

We have come a long way from being forbidden to gather, and then limited to outdoor Masses of no more than 50 participants. It should be noted that some of our larger Masses here are now seeing as many as 200 persons, which means there is room for more, since the church holds about 400.

I ask that you read the letter from the bishop that is part of this week's Bulletin. He makes it clear that observing the **Lord's Day** (Sunday) is central to our tradition and our Christian life. At the same time, Bishop Cantú encourages those who are ill, who have compromised health, due to any reason, to stay home. We will continue to livestream Masses on weekends and upload daily Masses to YouTube, as we realize that this continues to be an important part of Catholic life for a fair number of our parishioners and others.

As your pastor, I encourage you to join in rediscovering the beauty of the Lord's Day in our lives. Sunday is holy for us because it was on the first day of the week that Jesus rose from the dead. In a real way, every Sunday celebrates Easter. As an aside, that is why, even in more traditional times, Sunday was never a day of penance. And it surely should not be now. There was a popular expression a generation ago, "We are Easter People, and Alleluia is our song." (I just Googled [™] this to learn that these words go back to Saint Augustine of Hippo, in the Fourth Century.)

Sunday is the day the Christian people gather to give thanks around the tables of the Word and the Eucharist. It is there that we stand by virtue of the dignity of the Baptism we share. There, we bring to the Lord the ordinary and not so ordinary lives we have lived the past week, hearing God's word and receiving the Lord's Body and Blood, to be strengthened on our way, returning again, week after week.

Finally (for now), I have stated this many times over the decades I have been a priest: *when even one person is missing from our Sunday assembly, our bond is weakened, we are less.* It is as though the link between all of us is frayed. Parishioners often rationalize that any one of us doesn't matter, but you/we do, each and every one of us.

I invite you to rediscover the Lord's Day, here at Saint Clare, especially if circumstances in the past years have made this difficult.

Creation Care Tips



“No good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit; for each tree is known by its own fruit. Figs are not gathered from thorns, nor are grapes picked from a bramble bush.”—Luke 6:43-44

Here is an ecological proof: we know a tree by its fruits. But we must acknowledge the fact that many of this generation would not be able to tell a pear tree from a cherry tree, peach tree, or plum tree, not to mention bushes like the raspberry, blueberry, and blackberry. Consider planting a fruit tree or bush in your yard to provide an unforgettable learning experience for children, as well as a harvest to feed the family. Think about the pies you will be able to enjoy. Think about making jam to preserve the harvest. You will be living in a delectable garden! 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De Monseñor Fran, sobre el levantamiento de la dispensa general por parte del Obispo Cantú para participar en las Misas dominicales y festivas. Esto apareció en la actualización del viernes del 11 de febrero:

Como he estado anticipando desde hace algún tiempo, y mencionado a menudo en estas actualizaciones semanales, **la dispensa general de la obligación de celebrar Misa los domingos y días festivos esta siendo retirada por el Obispo Cantú, a partir del 6 de marzo, primer domingo de Cuaresma.** Como señalé recientemente, creemos que somos la última diócesis de nuestra región en hacerlo, ya que la mayoría ya levantó la dispensación el verano pasado.

Hemos recorrido un largo camino desde que se nos prohibió reunirnos y luego nos limitamos a Misas al aire libre de no más de 50 participantes. Cabe señalar que algunas de nuestras Misas más grandes aquí ahora son de hasta 200 personas, lo que significa que hay espacio para más, ya que la iglesia tiene capacidad para 400.

Les pido que lean la carta del obispo que forma parte del Boletín de esta semana. Él deja en claro que guardar el **Día del Señor** (domingo) es fundamental para nuestra tradición y nuestra vida cristiana. Al mismo tiempo, el Obispo Cantú exhorta a aquellos que están enfermos, que tienen problemas de salud, por cualquier motivo, a quedarse en casa. Continuaremos transmitiendo Misas en vivo los fines de semana y subiendo Misas diarias a YouTube, ya que nos damos cuenta de que esto sigue siendo una parte importante de la vida católica para una buena cantidad de nuestros feligreses y otros.

Como su pastor, los animo a unirse para redescubrir la belleza del Día del Señor en nuestras vidas. El domingo es santo para nosotros porque fue el primer día de la semana que Jesús resucitó de entre los muertos. De manera real, todos los domingos se celebra la Pascua. Aparte, es por eso que, incluso en tiempos más tradicionales, el domingo nunca fue un día de penitencia. Y seguramente no debería ser ahora. Hubo una expresión popular hace una generación: “Somos el Pueblo de Pascua, y Aleluya es nuestro canto”. (Acabo de buscar en Google [™] para saber que estas palabras se datan a San Agustín de Hipona, en el siglo cuarto).

El domingo es el día en que el pueblo cristiano se reúne para dar gracias en torno a las mesas de la Palabra y la Eucaristía. Es allí donde estamos en virtud de la dignidad del Bautismo que compartimos. Allí llevamos al Señor las vidas ordinarias y no tan ordinarias que hemos vivido la semana pasada, escuchando la palabra de Dios y recibiendo el Cuerpo y la Sangre del Señor, para ser fortalecidos en nuestro camino, volviendo nuevamente, semana tras semana.

Finalmente (por ahora), lo he dicho muchas veces durante las décadas que he sido sacerdote: *cuando falta una sola persona en nuestra asamblea dominical, nuestro vínculo se debilita, somos menos.* Es como si el vínculo entre todos nosotros estuviera desgastado. Los feligreses a menudo piensan que ninguno de nosotros importa, pero ustedes/nosotros sí, todos y cada uno de nosotros.

Los invito a redescubrir el Día del Señor, aquí en Santa Clara, especialmente si las circunstancias de los últimos años lo han hecho difícil.

Enquanto que nos sentimentos, direito ou errado, pois eles surgem espontaneamente do coração, revelam as nossas ações ou reações na sua nudez tal e qual. Os pensamentos agem diferentemente pois se não somos suficientemente fortes no nosso relacionamento com Cristo, podem-nos levar por sendas que nos levam à perdição! Lembrem-se do termo “não fazem juízos temerários?” Já era para avisar que o que sai da nossa boca nem sempre é o que temos e levamos no nosso coração. O Evangelho de hoje desafia-nos a tomar duas atitudes: ter uma visão espiritual sobre o que acontece e o que nos acontece; isto é, indentificar a graça, o convite que Deus nos faz em cada situação da nossa vida; testar se o que vai no nosso coração e o que é expresso pela nossa boca, revela claramente o que vai no nosso coração/ porque deste modo estamos a fugir aos nossos próprios meios de viver, enquanto pretendemos ensinar os outros a viver. A imagem que muitas vezes fazemos de mostrar aos outros que somos santinhos e bem ensinados não acerta com as ações de vida que vivemos. O nosso verdadeiro testemunho, com toda a fragilidade e vulnerabilidade de cada um dos nossos gestos, é o grande livro e a única palavra que se pode oferecer aos outros para que se convertam, se entreguem e se apaixonam por Jesus Cristo.
