In today's passage from Saint Paul's Letter to the Colossians, we hear a simple summary of both the Old Testament and the Gospel readings for this Sunday: "Think of what is above, not of what is on earth" (Col. 3:2). Otherwise, we will find it impossible to follow Jesus' teaching: "Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist of possessions" (Luke 12:15). And in another place, we read that "the love of money is the root of all evil" (1 Timothy 6:10).

It is very important that we keep all of this in mind and in the proper perspective. Money, possessions and "things" are not evil in themselves. It is, rather, what importance we give to them. If our goal is, in biblical terms, "piled up wealth," then we will come to no good end.

Because we live in this world, we cannot do without money and the things that money can buy. We need to tend to the proper upkeep of our homes, our church, our school and other buildings that house the work that we do. Our recent parish expenditure on a new roof for the church is not an end in itself, but to foster our gatherings for worship. The same is true of any upkeep and improvements that we make, including the upcoming project to air condition our school buildings. But our buildings are not an end in themselves and neither are very modest savings that the parish has after paying off the new roof.

As we consider our personal and family relationships with our material possessions, may we see them, too, as means to good ends, allowing each and all of us to "think of what is above" and to be good stewards of the gifts that we share.

Weekly Justice Challenge

Family reunions happen a lot during the summer months. You may have seen signs or notices in parks where families have reserved space to come together to catch up on news, share family stories and food, and to celebrate their heritage. When we take time to nurture relationships and to support and celebrate our families, it is a blessing. Our families are the first places we learn about faith and what it means to be a part of God’s family. There are some things we know about being a part of God’s family: we must feed the hungry, clothe the naked, give drink to those who thirst and visit those in prison. And our families help us do this good work. Your challenge this week is to discuss how your family has been a witness to you of being Christ in the world. Then choose a corporal work of mercy and practice it this week.

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Creation Care Tips



“Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one’s life does not consist in the abundance of possessions.” —Luke 12:15

This Gospel reading gives yet another reminder of the dangers of overconsumption and how it can harm us spiritually as well as harming the environment. An alternative of the man who built bigger barns to contain more things (an ancient equivalent to Americans building bigger houses or bigger garages or renting more storage space) is a spirituality that knows that “less stuff” can mean more fulfillment, more peace, and more time to focus on what is reality important: human relationships and a balanced relationship with the natural world. This week, take honest stock of what you might let go of so that you can embrace something else that is more important.

“And who is my neighbor?” This is the question that prompts Jesus to offer a story revealing the vastness of God’s mercy, and of course, Jesus’ expectation of his followers.

It is significant that Jesus offers a Samaritan as the ideal model of God’s mercy. Jews despised Samaritans as a lower form of humanity. So, of

course, it provoked his audience when Jesus told of the priest, then the Levite, walking thoughtlessly by the half-dead robbery victim lying at the side of the road. It is the third man, the Samaritan, who

their race, religion, gender, culture, ethnicity or social standing.

Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, uses the Parable of the Good Samaritan to urge us not only to imitate the mercy of Jesus in our

stops, renders the victim first aid and generously pays the innkeeper in advance for taking care of the brutally beaten victim.

Jesus’ parable teaches us that the neighbor is the person we encounter in our daily lives who is in dire need of our help. We are called to be good stewards of our fellow human beings, God’s precious children who we meet on our own journey in life. Our love and mercy are not confined to our families, friends, co-workers or fellow parishioners. The “sting” to the parable is that Jesus Christ expects us, his followers, to extend his love and mercy to others regardless of

personal lives, but to have the courage and compassion to promote a culture of Christ’s mercy in our society as well.

To be a disciple of Jesus Christ obliges us to love and show mercy to those we don’t know nor recognize as “one of us.” The Samaritan in Jesus’ story did not see a stranger, alien or foreigner. He simply saw a suffering human being who needed help. Jesus asks: “So who was the neighbor to the robbers’ victim?” The legal scholar replied: “The one who treated him with mercy.” Jesus said to the scholar as he would say to us today: “Go and do likewise.”

Involving Young People in Sacred Liturgy is Good Stewardship

Now that your teen or college age young adult has received the sacrament of Confirmation, isn’t it time to get them more deeply involved in the Mass? It is no secret that one of the best ways for a young person to nurture a greater love for the Eucharist is by a more active participation in the liturgy.

As good stewards of the faith life of teenagers and young adults, let’s identify their gifts and invite them to a fuller participation at the table of the Lord.

The National Federation for Catholic Youth Ministry has sought for many years to encourage greater participation by young people in the Mass. A publication from the Federation, *From Age to Age: The Challenge of Worship with Adolescents* (1997), started a national dialogue on how to get teenagers more involved in the Church’s celebration of the Eucharist.





Involvement by young people can include such liturgical activities as:

- Extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist
- Ushers
- Ministers of Hospitality
- Lectors/Readers
- Altar servers
- Gift bearers
- Cantors
- Musicians
- Choir members
- Leaders for Children's Liturgy of the Word

As good stewards of the faith life of teenagers and young adults, let's identify their gifts and invite them to a fuller participation at the table of the Lord. Get them involved. Make them feel as though they are welcome as mature, responsible stewards of the life of the parish family. They will be enriched by the experience, and so will the faith community.



Fifteen Random Stewardship Ideas for the Month of July

1. Invite a single friend over for a meal.
2. Turn off the TV, phone, and computer, and spend an hour devoted to someone you love.
3. Attend an extra Mass on a weekday this month.
4. Abstain from something you like – meat, a latte, a cold drink – on Fridays and save the money for a charity.
5. Take your rosary with you for an early morning walk.
6. Recycle more.
7. Think of a charity which is amply blessed at Christmas. Remember it with a gift mid-year.
8. Each day, say a prayer for one of the world's trouble spots.
9. Surprise an old friend with a phone call.
10. Buy or pick a flower for someone without a "reason".
11. Take your family to a farmer's market if in season.



12. Stop for a moment during your busy day and enjoy an ice cream cone or other favorite treat.
13. If you hear a great homily, tell the homilist.
14. Splurge on some produce and buy enough to share with someone in need.
15. On occasion, try turning your prayer before meals into a spontaneous prayer of thanks, using your own words.

De Monseñor Fran Cilia

En el pasaje de hoy de la Carta de San Pablo a los Colosenses, escuchamos un resumen simple tanto del Antiguo Testamento como de las lecturas del Evangelio para este domingo: “Piensen en lo de arriba, no en lo de la tierra” (Col. 3:2). De lo contrario, nos resultará imposible seguir la enseñanza de Jesús: “Guardaos de toda codicia, porque aunque uno sea rico, su vida no consiste en las posesiones” (Lc 12,15). Y en otro lugar leemos que “la raíz de todos los males es el amor al dinero” (1 Timoteo 6:10).

Es muy importante que tengamos todo esto en mente y en la perspectiva adecuada. El dinero, las posesiones y las “cosas” no son malas en sí mismas. Es, más bien, qué importancia les damos. Si nuestro objetivo es, en términos bíblicos, “acumular riquezas”, entonces no llegaremos a ningún buen fin.

Debido a que vivimos en este mundo, no podemos prescindir del dinero y de las cosas que el dinero puede comprar. Necesitamos ocuparnos del mantenimiento adecuado de nuestros hogares, nuestra iglesia, nuestra escuela y otros edificios que albergan el trabajo que hacemos. Nuestro reciente gasto parroquial en un nuevo techo para la iglesia no es un fin en sí mismo, sino fomentar nuestras reuniones para dar culto. Lo mismo se aplica a cualquier mantenimiento y mejora que hagamos, incluido el próximo proyecto de aire acondicionado de nuestros edificios escolares. Pero nuestros edificios no son un fin en sí mismos y tampoco lo son los modestísimos ahorros que tiene la parroquia después de pagar el nuevo techo.

Al considerar nuestras relaciones personales y familiares con nuestras posesiones materiales, que podamos verlas también como medios para buenos fines, permitiéndonos a todos y cada uno de nosotros “pensar en lo que está arriba” y ser buenos administradores de los dones que tenemos.

Reparem também no que diz o Livro da Sabedoria: “Quem trabalhou com a sabedoria, ciência e exito tem de deixar tudo a outro que nada fez” Nas nossas vidas vemos casos em que os bens acumulados com muito suor, muitos sacrifícios são depois de mortos esbanjados pelos familiares que cá ficaram. Questiona-se o comportamento do falecido enquanto cá viveu ou os familiares que loucamente esbanjaram ao desparato a fortuna que herdaram? Partilhemos na terra, a graça material e espiritual com que o Senhor nos abençoa. Assim acumularemos tesouros no Céu e experimentaremos alegria perene já na terra. Existe uma enorme diferença entre comovente e acomodamento. 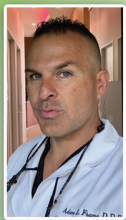
Piquenique Anual da nossa Comunidade
