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From Monsignor Fran Cilia

A sower went out to sow [some seed]. That is what sowers did, as found in the dictionary: “One who scatters seed on the ground to be grown for food.” And it was the seed that germinated, extended its roots and grew. The sower in Jesus’ parable is indiscriminate. Some seed falls on the path, or on rocky ground, or among the thorns. Some, though, fell on rich soil. It is this that produced abundant fruit.

Relating this parable about God’s word to the first reading from the prophet Isaiah, we hear that the word of the Lord is like the rain and snow that make the earth fertile: “So shall my word be that goes forth from my mouth; my word shall not return to me void, but shall do my will, achieving the end for which I sent it” (Isaiah 55:11).

God is as indiscriminate as the sower of the seed, broadcasting His word to all of creation, “groaning in labor pains even until now” (Romans 8:22).

It is for us to be that fertile soil that accepts and nurtures the word we have heard. We do so in the lives we lead, lives of love and care for one another and for all creation.

Creation Care Tips

“Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty.” —Matthew 13:8

Jesus uses an analogy of how God's kingdom grows through a multiplier effect. Take an action that will help you care for creation over and over. For example, get a re-usable water bottle and commit to taking it with you wherever you go so that you can avoid buying a disposable cup or bottled water. It takes roughly 17 million barrels of oil to make plastic water bottles every year, and approximately 1.5 million tons of plastic are expended in the bottling of water each year.

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Weekly Justice Challenge

Saint Camillus de Lellis, whom we honor on July 18th, is one of the patron saints of those who are sick. He himself was afflicted with illness, yet he reached out to care for those who were suffering—in hospitals, on plague-ridden ships, even on battlefields with injured military troops. He risked his own life to relieve the pain of others. Your challenge this week is to reach out to someone who is suffering—from physical pain, from depression or sadness, from alienation or bullying. Can you be the gentle hands and compassionate heart of Jesus for him or her? Who is it in your family, neighborhood or community who needs a healing touch?

O semeador saiu a semear!

O evangelho deste 15º domingo do tempo comum recorda-nos a parábola do semeador. Nesta passagem, é o próprio Jesus que narra a parábola e a explica aos discípulos. Jesus nem sempre é bem-sucedido na compreensão das suas parábolas. Desta vez, poderíamos transcrever a reflexão do evangelho deste domingo, usando as palavras do próprio Jesus na medida em que esta parábola já foi explicada pelo próprio Mestre. No entanto, vamos tentar aprofundar mais dados que nos ajudem a aplicar esta parábola às nossas vidas nos tempos que vivemos.

Todos nós temos como missão a arte de semear. Não estamos sós. Jesus passou a vida a semear. A Igreja é a grande semeadora da palavra de Deus que gera esperança. Cada um de nós, em comunhão com a Igreja, pode ser um especialista na arte de semear. Assumida a nossa vocação de semeadores e segundo o evangelho, há três pontos a termos em consideração: 1º - ao semeador compete semear, não colher os frutos da sua sementeira. 2º - os frutos não aparecem quando queremos mas quando menos esperamos e muitas vezes não os chegamos a ver durante a nossa vida. 3º - o terreno em que as sementes caem é muito imprevisível.

Retomemos o 1º ponto: a nossa missão de semeadores não é colher porque a vinha e a sementeira não é nossa mas do Senhor. Por isso, pela graça de Deus, passamos a vida a beneficiar de frutos que outros, no passado, semearam, mas cujos frutos nunca colheram. Hoje em dia vivemos na cultura da pressa, queremos tudo rápido. Muitas vezes queremos a fruta fora da sua época natural. O evangelho convida-nos a sermos prudentes e pacientes. O Senhor convida-nos a semear sem esperarmos colher os frutos. O 2º ponto sublinha a importância de cuidar da vinha e entregá-la em cada dia ao Senhor. A vinha não é nossa está-nos confiada. Mas temos de cuidar do que o Senhor nos confia. No 3º ponto são referidos os terrenos em que as sementeiras são feitas, isto é, os corações. Estes podem ser de carne, tenros, abertos, ou podem ser duros, difíceis. Ainda assim, somos convidados a semear sempre e durante a vida toda. Por vezes, veem-se flores que nascem no meio das rochas. Assim pode acontecer com os corações mais frios: também eles têm bocadinhos de Deus, só precisam de ser regados, trabalhados e desenvolvidos. Recapitulando: ao semeador compete semear e cuidar. Ao Senhor da vinha compete colher. A todos e a cada um de nós, compete participar na sementeira e agradecer ao Senhor os frutos que recebemos, tantas vezes de sementeiras feitas com sacrifícios pelas gerações que viveram antes de nós. Com um coração cheio e agradecido, continuemos a fazer o nosso trabalho. Não estamos sós!

Um Adeus – Até á Volta: Assim neste espírito desejamos um bom regresso do padre Francisco Rodrigues a Portugal. Irá continuar com a sua missão de sacerdote nos projectos que o seu superior tem para lhe dar. Sejam eles quais foram continuará a dar o seu melhor para que os projectos da Comunidade Jesuita sejam bem sucedidos. O coração da Comunidade Portuguesa de Santa Clara continuará voltado para o Espírito Santo a rogar-Lhe que o ilumine, que o continue a avivar com as Suas chamas e doms a vontade de servir o povo de Deus, o proteja e o livre dos males a que todos estamos sujeitos. Vaia com Deus e regresse a nós sempre que for possível.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

At Mass with my family recently, my five-year-old daughter caught the last four words of the mystery of faith as if she was hearing them for the first time. She was bursting with excitement as we finished saying, “We proclaim your death, O Lord, and profess your resurrection, until you come again.” She turned to me and said, “Mom! We said, ‘until you come again.’ Does that mean Jesus is coming back? He’s coming HERE?” What a lovely, emotion-filled response to learning that truth. She has heard those words countless times, but this time she heard the truth behind them. Her soul has been made for relationship with God from her time in the womb. The Holy Spirit has been preparing her to receive those words when she was ready to hear them in their fullness, and as the responsorial psalm proclaimed: “The seed that falls on good ground will yield a fruitful harvest.” For those in the young, challenging years when it may seem easier to leave the little ones at home rather than take them to Mass, let’s remember what we are told in the first reading from Isaiah. “Thus says the Lord: ... my word shall not return to me void, but shall do my will, achieving the end for which I sent it.”

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

How often do you find yourself listening to a friend or family member not to really hear what they are saying, but to plan your response? Do we do that while we pray as well? Sometimes I catch myself praying with an inner monologue behind it, deciding how I want that prayer to be answered. Now all of this may not be exactly what Jesus meant when he said, “This is why I speak to them in parables, because *they look but do not see and hear but do not listen or understand,*” but it is worth exploring. When we are so anxious to get our words in – either to another person, or to God, we’re not really being the rich soil that the other’s words deserve. We’re not even the rocky ground or the thorny path of which the Lord speaks; we’re more like a giant rubber wall off of which the words bounce! Let’s take some time to consider how our practice of listening and receiving others, including the Lord, is preparing us (or not) for the return of Jesus. And if there is room to improve, now is a good time to do it.

PRAY *Lord, Jesus Christ, prepare my heart and my soul so that your words and your desires for my life will not fall on rocky soil. Give me the strength to be a Godly sower to all I encounter, especially my family, so your glory will be revealed. Amen.*

Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

It's not uncommon to hear people complain that we Catholics often fail in communicating our faith. Fair enough. We can and should improve there. But it's interesting to notice that Jesus himself was implicitly accused by his disciples of a similar failure. This week in Matthew's gospel they are perplexed that he speaks to the crowds in ambiguous parables. The Lord's riddles leave many people more confused than before. He responds by pointing out that his parables have an intentional dual purpose: to hide (for some) and to reveal (for others) his Gospel: "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted" (Matthew 13:11). Is Jesus being unnecessarily difficult, obscurantist, or, worse, elitist?

No. We have to remember that all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge lie hidden in him (c.f., Col. 2:3). He is the word of God from heaven to be planted in the earth of our humanity to bear great fruit. However, like a lover delicately pursuing his beloved, we're dealing with a relationship, not new data. When we aren't willing to personally accept Jesus into our lives, the "info" of the Gospel will simply not make sense to us. It'll seem bizarre, esoteric, or like incoherent religious-speak. But when we are willing to accept Jesus into our lives, everything else starts to make sense. When others don't understand the Church or the Lord, let's be patient. Love is patient. Sometimes it has to hide before it is revealed.
