The polarization we experience in the Church and society is not healthy and does not contribute to the building up of the world, our nation or the Church into the very best that we can be. Instead, it tears us apart, reducing us to less than the sum of our parts.

The recent experience of World Youth Day was an antidote to the kind of thinking that fosters a “we versus them” life. Young people from almost every nation gathered in a kind of chaotic harmony; every language under the sun was spoken, although English was clearly the most prevalent of all. The diversity of cultures was enriching and eye-opening, especially for the youth. As Pope Francis mentioned, they themselves are a sign of hope for a better world, not based on the politics of fear and division.

I mention this in light of the readings we hear this weekend.

The Lord, through the prophet Isaiah, declares that “My house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples” (Isaiah 56:7). In our reading from the gospel of Matthew, Jesus praises the faith of a woman who was a Canaanite, a non-believer, and granted her request that he heal her daughter. As the “Apostle to the Gentiles,” Saint Paul broke down the barriers that had separated the Jews and the non-Jews who believed in Jesus.

We need to translate these biblical passages into our lives, our politics and our faith. Where do we draw imaginary lines that exclude others for reasons of ethnicity, language, sexuality, or any other distinction? The politics of exclusion cannot be our way. As Pope Francis repeatedly stated in Lisbon earlier this month, the Church is for all. . . “Todos, todos, todos!”

Thank you all for your generosity and support in building up our young people and for being part of these everlasting memories of joy.

Reflexão por João Pereira Arruda

A mulher cananea do Evangelho não desistiu, não desanimou com a resposta de Jesus ao pedido de ajuda feito por essa mulher. “*Não é justo que se tome o pão dos filhos para lançar aos cachorrinhos*”. Foi uma interpelação estranhamente contra a corrente do que sabemos de Jesus. A cananea não se intimidou e com toda a coragem respondeu a Jesus: “*Mas também os cachorrinhos comem das migalhas que caem da mesa de seus donos.*” Esta resposta podia ser rude, mas interpelou Jesus em agraciá-la a mulher cananea. Esta mulher tal como a viúva que importunava o juiz para lhe conceder justiça do mesmo modo insistiu com Jesus para lhe conceder a graça de curar a filha. A fé da cananea levou-a a insistir com Jesus pela cura da filha. Como mãe que quer só o bem; neste caso, da filha, levou-a a insistir com Jesus para lhe conceder essa graça. As graças que Deus nos concede não são dadas para que as guardemos. Não são dados para que se as ponham numa conta de poupanças. A graça de Deus não são geridas como se gere dinheiro. Possuindo Jesus o dom da cura, Jesus concedeu a graça da cura á filha da mulher cananea que necessitava de ser curada. A graça de Deus não gera graça. A graça tem uma forma invertida: Quanto mais acumulamos, mais se perde. Quanto tentamos guardar a graça recebida, ela impede a fonte de continuar a jorrar. O nosso Deus nem é gestor nem administrador; o nosso Deus é amor; não sabe fazer outra coisa senão amar! A graça não se gere dá-se! Este episódio de Jesus com a mulher cananea serviu de cenário da intervenção dos discípulos chamaram a atenção de Jesus de atender a mulher cananea. O desespero de ver a filha doente e sem cura levou-a a gritar por Jesus para que Este a atendesse porque esta tinha a certeza que a cura da filha só Jesus a podia curar. Assim também nos poderia acontecer se, ao alimentarmos a nossa fé, essa nos levasse a acreditar em Jesus e nas graças que Ele nos concede. A acção da mulher cananea nos sirva de exemplo de como interpelar Jesus nas nossas orações. Que estas saiam dos nossos corações com o mesmo fervor, a mesma certeza e a necessidade de interpelarmos Jesus para nos conceder as graças de viver em felicidade.

Levar a Santa Comunhão aos enfermos e idosos da Comunidade Portuguesa: Desde 1977 que os Ministros extraordinários da Eucaristia servem a nossa comunidade levando a comunhão ás pessoas acamadas da nossa comunidade seja por idade avançada ou por doença. Desde 2002 a Diocese de San José pede para que se tenha um programa que contenha os nomes, endereços e telefones das pessoas que recebem a Santa Comunhão. Neste momento é necessário que todos os Ministros da Eucaristia deem toda essa informação ao coordenador João Arruda para que tenhamos o programa completamente correcto e que não falhe uma pessoa, mesmo que esta não receba a comunhão todos os Domingos. Por vezes nem a própria comunidade não se dá conta deste serviço feito generosamente pelos nossos ministros Eucarísticos, mas quem recebe estes serviços aprecia e agradece. É por esse Ministério que a nossa missa se estende áqueles que por debilidades físicas não puderam vir á igreja. Nos nossos tempos acontecem haver burocracias demasiadas e ter uma lista dos doentes em que servimos parece uma frivolidade mas há razões muito fortes pela qual a nossa Diocese exige ter uma lista completa daqueles que nós servimos.

De Monseñor Fran Cilia

La polarización que experimentamos en la Iglesia y la sociedad no es saludable y no contribuye a la edificación del mundo, nuestra nación o la Iglesia en lo mejor que podemos ser. En cambio, nos destroza, reduciéndonos a menos que la suma de nuestras partes.

La experiencia reciente de la Jornada Mundial de la Juventud fue un antídoto contra el tipo de pensamiento que fomenta una vida de “nosotros contra ellos”. Jóvenes de casi todas las naciones se reunían en una especie de armonía caótica; se hablaban todos los idiomas bajo el sol, aunque el inglés era claramente el más frecuente de todos. La diversidad de culturas fue enriquecedora y reveladora, especialmente para los jóvenes. Como mencionó el Papa Francisco, ellos mismos son un signo de esperanza para un mundo mejor, no basado en la política del miedo y la división.

Menciono esto a la luz de las lecturas que escuchamos este fin de semana.

El Señor, a través del profeta Isaías, declara que “Mi casa, casa de oración será llamada para todos los pueblos” (Isaías 56:7). En nuestra lectura del evangelio de Mateo, Jesús alaba la fe de una mujer que era cananea, no creyente, y le concedió su pedido de curar a su hija. Como el “Apóstol de los gentiles”, San Pablo rompió las barreras que habían separado a los judíos y los no judíos que creían en Jesús.

Necesitamos traducir estos pasajes bíblicos a nuestras vidas, nuestra política y nuestra fe. ¿Dónde trazamos líneas imaginarias que excluyan a otros por motivos de etnia, idioma, sexualidad o cualquier otra distinción? La política de la exclusión no puede ser nuestro camino. Como dijo repetidamente el Papa Francisco en Lisboa a principios de este mes, la Iglesia es para todos. . . “¡Todos, todos, todos!”

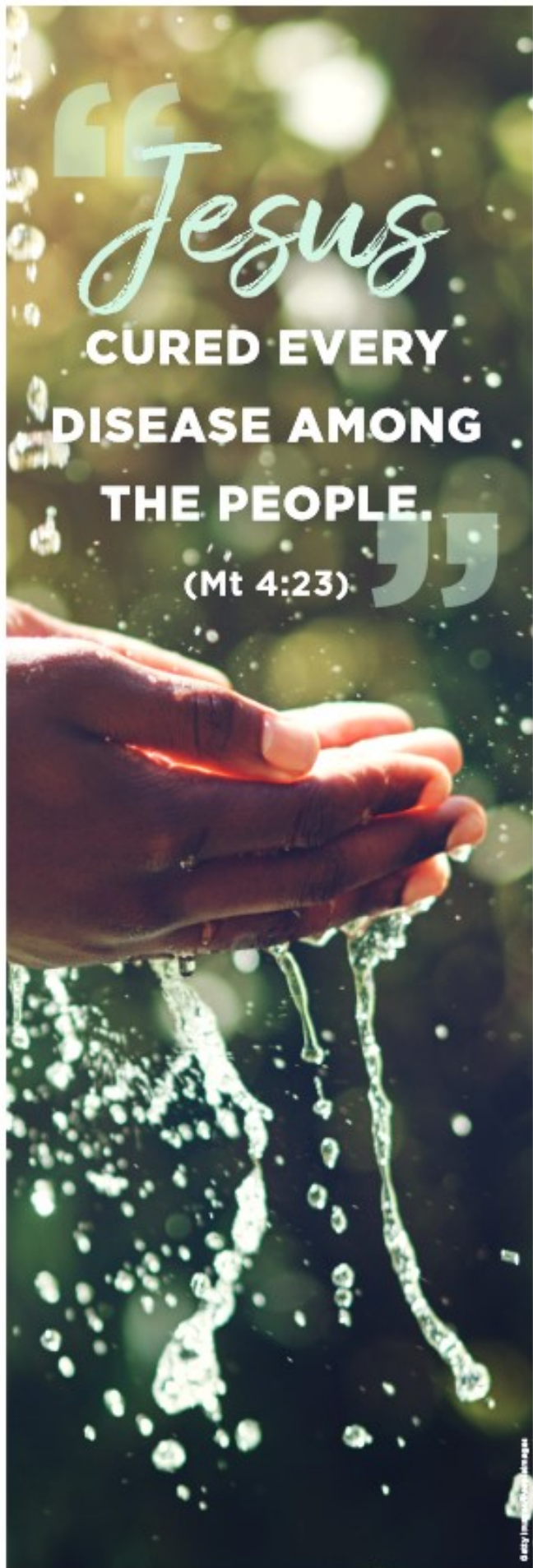

Is 56:1, 6-7 | Rom 11:13-15, 29-32 | Mt 15:21-28

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The abundance of God's love for us is what stood out for me in our readings today. If we consider the concept of abundance outside the Scriptures, it can be tricky. When we have it, does it imply we have too much when others have too little? If we are speaking of material things, then perhaps. But God's infinite and merciful love for us resound in each of our readings today, and this is cause for joy. In Isaiah, the Lord announces that he will accept offerings from anyone who holds to his covenant, Jewish or not. Saint Paul stresses that God's mercy is for *all*, and Jesus, after some back-and-forth with the Canaanite woman, heals the woman's daughter because of her great faith. God never tires of desiring healing and wholeness for *all* his children, which is a great gift. Let this gift of grace from God be a catalyst for us to reach out in love to others so that we also can come to God's "holy mountain and [be made] joyful in [his] house of prayer."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

How can we reach out in love to others as we called to do? Perhaps we can start with our parish. Is there a ministry we have read about in the bulletin that needs volunteers? Or a coordinator? Perhaps it is time to ask God how we can be his instrument in the world. We can start small. I will never forget when my friend volunteered to run our Vacation Bible School one summer. Of course, she turned to her friends to help her with this daunting task! What she desperately needed was someone to go from classroom to classroom and lead the children in song. Talk about out of my comfort zone! But she gave me the music books and song suggestions, and pretty soon, "This Little Light of Mine" was reverberating through the halls of the school. 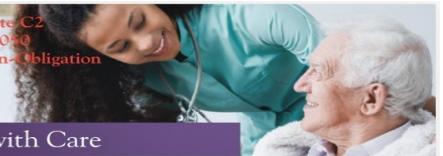
