



This Sunday and on the next two weekends, we will hear readings especially chosen to guide the Elect toward the waters of Baptism. These scriptures are so essential to this process that they are the ones heard every year at Masses in which the Scrutinies are celebrated. Since we are in “Cycle A” of the Sunday readings, they will form the heart of the Liturgy of the Word at every weekend celebration of the Eucharist, here and throughout the Catholic world.

On this Third Sunday of Lent, Jesus encounters the Samaritan woman at the well at Sychar. There, He promises the gift of “living water. . . the water I shall give will become. . . a spring of water welling up to eternal life.”

Next weekend, we will hear the Lord’s encounter with the man who was born blind. Jesus declares: “While I am in the world, I am the light of the world. . . I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see might see, and those who do see might become blind.”

On the last Sunday before Palm Sunday, we will listen to the story of the raising of Lazarus from the dead, the greatest of the “signs” that Jesus performed. Jesus Himself had stated that “Lazarus has died. And I am glad for you that I was not there, that you may believe. Let us go to him.”

The purpose of each of the signs that Jesus performed was to increase faith in His followers, even as the Lord continues to do for our Elect and, indeed, for all the baptized.

We begin this Saturday evening the celebration of the first of three Scrutinies (penitential rites) that are intended to help the Elect to walk the path that leads to their incorporation into Christ and the Church. Let us hold them in our prayers.

Weekly Justice Challenges

The Samaritan woman, also known as the woman at the well, is featured in Sunday's Gospel. She was a member of a tribe with which the Jews did not interact, she was a woman, and she had a fairly bad reputation after being married several times. Even with these three strikes against her, Jesus made her the first evangelizer of her village. Your challenge this week is to identify someone in your life who is not from your immediate circle of family and friends, someone you might consider an outsider, and listen to or closely observe that person. See if you can learn something about Jesus from the way he or she lives and speaks. Show appreciation for this "outsider" in any way you can.



Creative Care Tips

As the climate continues to change, millions suffer from a lack of clean water for drinking, washing, and irrigating. Even if your community isn't suffering from drought or reduced supply, do something big or small to reduce your usage. If you have the means, the next time you buy a dishwasher or washing machine, purchase one that uses less water. Learn about capturing the gray water from your washing machine to use in your garden. Often the conversion is simple and inexpensive. Consider replacing your thirsty lawn with a drought tolerant landscape. On a smaller scale, cut back your shower time a few minutes

Boletim Paroquial Português
8 de março de 2026 – III Domingo da Quaresma

Quase a meio da nossa caminhada quaresmal, e seguindo o modelo de Jesus Cristo, partimos do exemplo de Jesus vencedor das tentações no primeiro domingo, passando pela visão em que Se manifesta e mostra a Sua divindade no meio dos profetas Moisés e Elias, no Monte Tabor, perante os Apóstolos Pedro, Tiago e João.

Neste domingo, Jesus diz à mulher samaritana que Ele é a fonte de água viva; aquela que, quem dela beber, nunca mais terá sede. Para nossa reflexão, vejamos o Senhor Jesus no cenário em que Se apresenta aparentemente frágil perante uma mulher de condição simples. Ela, confusa por um judeu falar com ela e, ainda por cima, pedir-lhe água, não conseguia compreender Jesus.

Era ao meio-dia, e o intenso calor fazia-se sentir. Jesus, na sua condição humana, também tinha sede, mas queria, acima de tudo, revelar-Se, dizendo à samaritana que ela já tivera vários maridos e que aquele com quem vivia não era seu.

“Senhor, dá-me dessa água!”, pediu a samaritana.

O rochedo que brotou água no deserto era Jesus Cristo, e nos nossos dias é o mesmo Jesus que nos sacia de todas as sedes: sede de amor, sede de justiça, sede de paz. Todas estas são sedes que trazem felicidade àqueles que procuram Jesus.

Nesta nossa caminhada quaresmal, façamo-la lado a lado com Jesus. Ele é o nosso guia, porque é também, no fim desta caminhada, Aquele que será o Cordeiro imolado para a justificação da humanidade e a remissão dos pecados. Ele ressuscitará e vencerá a morte, para que todos nós tenhamos vida, e a tenhamos em abundância.

A meio desta caminhada, pensemos no que ainda podemos fazer pelos outros que, por qualquer motivo, deixaram de seguir Jesus e procuram saciar as suas sedes nos vícios e nos desregramentos, através do álcool e das drogas.

Peçamos a Jesus que não nos falte energia nem vontade para O acompanhar e chegar à Páscoa da Ressurreição com Ele. Tal como a samaritana, peçamos ao Senhor que também nós queremos beber da Sua água. Peçamos ao Senhor que, pelo Seu Espírito Santo, avive a nossa fé e nos ajude a vencer as nossas fraquezas.

É na oração que pedimos ajuda para as nossas carências e fragilidades. Lembremo-nos de que as caminhadas quaresmais são feitas com esforços de oração, penitência e caridade. Assim, a felicidade e a alegria renascem na Páscoa da Ressurreição de Jesus Cristo.

Tempo da Quaresma:

A nossa paróquia está a oferecer os livros pretos nas versões em inglês e espanhol. Estes ajudamos a ser mais orantes e convidam-nos a meditar durante todo o tempo quaresmal.

Também estarão à disposição os cartões das “tigelas de arroz”. Estas servem para amearhar os sacrifícios que fazemos: aquilo que gostaríamos numa refeição mais elaborada pode ser substituído por uma mais simples, sendo a diferença colocada na tigela.

No boletim paroquial serão indicadas as datas para o Serviço Penitencial.

Todas as sextas-feiras, a nossa paróquia tem um programa que começa às 18h com uma refeição simples de sopa e, depois, a devoção da Via-Sacra na igreja, às 19h. Outros programas e atividades serão anunciados oportunamente.

Are You Listening?

If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts." (See Psalm 95.) Our psalm prayer invites us to respond to the Word of God. A positive response should be assumed as ordinary: very few among us would deliberately ignore God's voice. The challenge is not in responding "yes" to the invitation of the Lord but rather in "hearing" his voice.

There are so many voices that daily compete for attention. We seem to be bombarded every waking moment with some kind of noise that demands attention and action. At one time, Neil Diamond might have been able to celebrate the "Beautiful Noise" of the city, but it is far more difficult for us today. Frankly, the noise around us is deafening, and most people long for true silence, a break in the pattern, a vacation from the frantic anxiety that seems to be present.

A wonderful Lenten practice—indeed, a spiritual practice that goes well beyond Lent—is to freely choose to disconnect from distraction. Resist the temptation to plug in the earbuds. Refrain from the distraction of social media content. Leave your cell phone in the living room, go sit in the backyard, and pay attention to nothing. "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:11), the psalmist reminds us. Listen for God's voice, hear his call, and respond to the invitation. ●

«**S**i hoy escuchas su voz, no endurezcas tu corazón» (véase Salmo 95). Nuestra oración salmódica nos invita a responder a la Palabra de Dios. Una respuesta positiva debería darse por sentada: muy pocos de nosotros ignoraríamos deliberadamente la voz de Dios. El reto no está en responder «sí» a la invitación del Señor, sino en «escuchar» su voz.

Hay tantas voces que compiten diariamente por nuestra atención. Parece que cada momento del día nos bombardea algún tipo de ruido que exige atención y acción. En su momento, Neil Diamond pudo celebrar el «Beautiful Noise» (el hermoso ruido) de la ciudad, pero hoy en día nos resulta mucho más difícil. Francamente, el ruido que nos rodea es ensordecedor, y la mayoría de la gente anhela el silencio verdadero, una ruptura con la rutina, unas vacaciones de la ansiedad frenética que parece estar siempre presente.

Una maravillosa práctica cuaresmal —de hecho, una práctica espiritual que va mucho más allá de la Cuaresma— es elegir libremente desconectarse de las distracciones. Resiste la tentación de conectarte los audífonos. Evita la distracción de los contenidos de las redes sociales. Deja tu celular en la sala, siéntate en el jardín y no prestes atención a nada. «Quédate quieto y reconoce que yo soy Dios» (Salmo 46,10), nos recuerda el salmista. Escucha la voz de Dios, escucha su llamada y responde a la invitación. ●

¿Te resulta difícil el silencio?

Este domingo y los próximos dos fines de semana escucharemos lecturas especialmente escogidas para guiar a los Elegidos hacia las aguas del Bautismo. Estas Escrituras son tan esenciales para este proceso que son las que se proclaman cada año en las Misas en las que se celebran los Escrutinios. Como estamos en el “Ciclo A” de las lecturas dominicales, ellas constituirán el corazón de la Liturgia de la Palabra en cada celebración dominical de la Eucaristía, aquí y en todo el mundo católico.

En este Tercer Domingo de Cuaresma, Jesús se encuentra con la mujer samaritana en el pozo de Sicar. Allí le promete el don del “agua viva... el agua que yo le daré se convertirá... en un manantial que brota hasta la vida eterna”.

El próximo fin de semana escucharemos el encuentro del Señor con el hombre que nació ciego. Jesús declara: “Mientras yo esté en el mundo, soy la luz del mundo... Yo vine a este mundo para un juicio: para que los que no ven, vean; y los que ven, se vuelvan ciegos”.

El último domingo antes del Domingo de Ramos escucharemos el relato de la resurrección de Lázaro, el mayor de los “signos” que realizó Jesús. Él mismo había dicho: “Lázaro ha muerto. Y me alegro por ustedes de no haber estado allí, para que crean. Vamos a verlo”.

El propósito de cada uno de los signos que Jesús realizó fue aumentar la fe de sus seguidores, y el Señor continúa haciendo lo mismo por nuestros Elegidos y, en verdad, por todos los bautizados.

Este sábado por la tarde comenzamos la celebración del primero de los tres Escrutinios (ritos penitenciales), destinados a ayudar a los Elegidos a recorrer el camino que los conduce a su incorporación a Cristo y a la Iglesia. Tengámoslos presentes en nuestras oraciones.

Desafíos semanales de justicia

La mujer samaritana, también conocida como la mujer en el pozo, aparece en el Evangelio del domingo. Ella pertenecía a una tribu con la que los judíos no interactuaban, era mujer y tenía mala reputación tras haberse casado varias veces. A pesar de estos puntos en su contra, Jesús la convirtió en la primera evangelizadora de su pueblo. Tu desafío esta semana es identificar a alguien en tu vida que no pertenezca a tu círculo cercano de familiares y amigos, alguien que consideres un extraño, y escucharlo u observarlo con atención.
