Creative Care Tips



"All the earth worships you; they sing praises to you, sing praises to your name." —Psalm 66:4

This week, make time to join creation in praising God. Go for a hike and breathe in the fresh scents of the forest; sit on a beach and glory in the expanse of water; sit under a tree, close your eyes and listen to the birds chirping above you. Do whatever it is that will help you join your spirit to that of creation.

Weekly Justice Challenges

St. Damien of Molokai is honored on May 10. Damien was canonized a saint because of his dedication and service to the lepers on the island of Molokai in Hawaii. Lepers were considered pariahs who were a threat to healthy people because of their contagious illness. Many of them were torn from their families when they were diagnosed with leprosy. They were taken to Molokai and never saw their loved ones again. (Lepers at the time of Jesus faced a similar alienation. They were often forced to wear a bell around their necks so that people could run from them when they heard the bell.) Damien ministered to the physical and emotional needs of the lepers on Molokai. He followed Jesus' example of reaching out to these rejected human beings, offering them the human contact—the simple touch—which they were denied. Your challenge this week is to look for a leper in your life, but not necessarily in the literal sense of a person with a skin disease. Rather, look for someone who craves human contact and human touch but is denied it. It might be someone who is lonely or angry, smelly or dirty, mentally ill, imprisoned in some way, or living alone without a family member or friend to touch them. Whatever the person's reality, reach out in love and compassion. Offer the human touch which every person on earth needs to survive and thrive.

The Second Vatican Council challenged religious orders to adapt and renew religious life in light of their charism. Many communities of women religious followed the lead of the Spirit to new ways of living in solidarity around the globe with the poor and marginalized. By the very nature of their work and ministry, they began to experience first hand the social conditions that contributed to poverty and human suffering, especially of women. Informed by the feminist theological and spiritual writings of Sr. Sandra Schneiders, IHM, this workshop will explore how women religious were led by their faith to action in the areas of human trafficking, migration, ecojustice, education, and refugee assistance. By focusing on these stories of solidarity, we too are challenged to embrace a definition of feminism that advances the flourishing of all peoples.

A liturgia deste Domingo, à semelhança dos anteriores desde a Páscoa, apresentamos um Jesus Cristo que Se revela aos Apóstolos e discípulos, encorajando-os a dar continuidade à Sua Igreja. Para isso, assegura-lhes que não ficarão sós: o Espírito Santo virá sobre eles.

No Aleluia do Evangelho de hoje, o próprio Jesus afirma: “Não vos deixarei órfãos, diz o Senhor; vou partir, mas voltarei, e o vosso coração alegrar-se-á.” Promete ainda enviar o Espírito Santo, o Defensor, que com os seus sete dons lhes dará coragem, afastará os medos e os enviará por todo o mundo a proclamar a Palavra de Deus.

Rezemos pelas nossas mães falecidas, que continuam a interceder por nós junto de Deus, e cujo legado permanece vivo nas nossas vidas. Rezemos pelas mães que vivem na angústia de não poder cuidar dos seus filhos e os confiam à adoção. Rezemos também pelas mulheres que desejariam ser mães e não o podem ser.

A história da Igreja oferece-nos muitos exemplos de mulheres de fé que, com oração e sacrifício, alcançaram graças para os seus filhos. Como comunidade, somos chamados a apoiá-las também com a nossa oração.

Introductory Rites: Welcoming & Participation

WEEK 5 (May 9-10, 2026)

Asking for Mercy, Giving Praise

After the entrance song, the priest, in persona Christi, greets the assembly with "**The Lord be with you.**" This is not a pleasantry; it is a declaration: Christ is truly present among us. The phrase echoes through Scripture: the angel's greeting to Mary at the Annunciation, what Boaz says to his harvesters in Ruth, the Risen Christ's words to the disciples in the upper room, and so on. When the assembly answers, "**And with your spirit,**" we acknowledge that the priest is not simply a man greeting us, but that the Spirit of God, received at his ordination, is acting through him. In this exchange, the whole theology of the Mass is expressed: Christ is here, his Spirit is at work, and we are about to encounter Him together.

Then, we come to a profound moment: the **Penitential Act**. This is when we, as a community, acknowledge our need for God's mercy. We come before the Lord, not pretending to be perfect, but humbly admitting that we are sinners in need of grace. This is not just reciting words; it is naming the truth about ourselves: that we are beloved children of God who fall short, hurt others, and fail to love as we should. In doing so together, we receive the communal assurance that we are never alone in our need.

The form of the Penitential Act may vary from Sunday to Sunday. You might recognize the Confiteor — "I confess to almighty God..." — prayed together as a community. Another form invites a brief examination of conscience led by the priest. A third prays the Kyrie: "Lord, have mercy / Christ, have mercy." The form changes; the grace does not.

On most Sundays, after acknowledging our sinfulness, we shift to praise with the Gloria. This ancient hymn has been prayed by Christians for nearly two thousand years. It bursts with joy: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will!" From confession to praise, this is the rhythm of the Christian life. We acknowledge our need, receive God's mercy, and then overflow with gratitude. This week, notice the Greeting and receive it as the declaration it is: Christ is truly here. Enter the Penitential Act with a willing heart. And when the Gloria comes, let it pour out of you, because you have just been met with mercy.

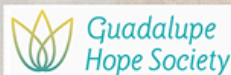

Renovados en la mesa del Señor

Ritos Introdutorios: Acogida y Participación

Semana 5 (9-10 de mayo 2026)

Pidiendo Misericordia, Alabando a Dios

Tras el canto de entrada, el sacerdote, in persona Christi, saluda a la asamblea con **“El Señor esté con ustedes.”** No se trata de una simple cortesía, sino de una declaración: Cristo está verdaderamente presente entre nosotros. La frase resuena a lo largo de las Escrituras: el saludo del ángel a María en la Anunciación, lo que Booz dice a sus segadores en el libro de Rut, las palabras de Cristo resucitado a los discípulos en el Cenáculo, y así sucesivamente. Cuando la asamblea responde: **“Y con tu espíritu,”** reconocemos que el sacerdote no es simplemente un hombre que nos saluda, sino que el Espíritu de Dios, recibido en su ordenación, está actuando a través de él. En este intercambio se expresa toda la teología de la Misa: Cristo está aquí, su Espíritu está actuando y estamos a punto de encontrarnos con Él juntos.

Luego, llegamos a un momento profundo: el **Acto Penitencial**. Es entonces cuando, como comunidad, reconocemos nuestra necesidad de la misericordia de Dios. Nos presentamos ante el Señor, sin pretender ser perfectos, sino admitiendo humildemente que somos pecadores que necesitamos la gracia. No se trata solo de recitar palabras; se trata de nombrar la verdad sobre nosotros mismos: que somos hijos amados de Dios que nos quedamos cortos, lastimamos a otros y no amamos como deberíamos. Al hacerlo juntos, recibimos la seguridad comunitaria de que nunca estamos solos en nuestra necesidad.

La forma del Acto Penitencial puede variar de domingo en domingo. Quizás reconozcas el Confiteor —“Confieso ante Dios todopoderoso...”— rezado juntos como comunidad. Otra forma invita a un breve examen de conciencia guiado por el sacerdote. Una tercera reza el Kyrie: “Señor, ten piedad / Cristo, ten piedad.” La forma cambia; la gracia no.

La mayoría de los domingos, después de reconocer nuestra pecaminosidad, pasamos a la alabanza con el Gloria. Este antiguo himno ha sido rezado por los Cristianos durante casi dos mil años. Rebosa de alegría: “¡Gloria a Dios en las alturas, y en la tierra paz a las personas de buena voluntad!” De la confesión a la alabanza, este es el ritmo de la vida Cristiana. Reconocemos nuestra necesidad, recibimos la misericordia de Dios y luego desbordamos de gratitud.

Esta semana, presten atención al saludo y recíbanlo como la declaración que es: Cristo está verdaderamente aquí. Entren en el Acto Penitencial con un corazón dispuesto. Y cuando llegue el Gloria, dejen que brote de ustedes, porque acaban de ser recibidos con misericordia.

Jesús prometió a los discípulos que les enviaría otro “Defensor”, que intercedería por ellos; también les prometió que no los abandonaría, que no los dejaría huérfanos. El Señor también aseguró a sus seguidores que se manifestaría a quienes lo aman.

Nosotros somos herederos de estas promesas. El Señor Jesús permanece presente entre nosotros, así como lo estuvo con los Apóstoles, los demás discípulos y las primeras generaciones de cristianos. El Defensor —el Espíritu Santo— continúa siendo la garantía de la presencia constante de Jesús hoy.

Este fin de semana y el próximo celebramos de manera muy especial cómo el Señor está con nosotros: en el don de la Eucaristía, que nuestros jóvenes feligreses reciben por primera vez en su Primera Comunión. Oramos para que crezcan cada día en el amor de Dios y, junto con sus padres, familias, catequistas y toda nuestra comunidad parroquial, den gracias por poder compartir el misterio del amor de Dios.

Desafíos Semanales De Justicia

La festividad de San Damián de Molokai es conmemorada el 10 de mayo. Damián fue canonizado por su dedicación y servicio a los leprosos de la isla de Molokai, en Hawái. Los leprosos eran marginados por considerarse una amenaza para las personas sanas debido a su enfermedad contagiosa. Muchos fueron separados de sus familias al ser diagnosticados con lepra. Eran llevados a Molokai y nunca volvían a ver a sus seres queridos. (Los leprosos en la época de Jesús sufrían una exclusión similar. A menudo a los leprosos se les obligaba a llevar una campana alrededor del cuello para que la gente pudiera alejarse de ellos al oírlos). Damián atendió las necesidades físicas y emocionales de los leprosos de Molokai. Él siguió el ejemplo de Jesús al acercarse a estos seres humanos que eran rechazados, ofreciéndoles el contacto humano—el simple toque—que se les negaba. Tu desafío esta semana es buscar a un leproso en tu vida, pero no necesariamente en el sentido literal de una persona con una enfermedad de la piel. Más bien, busca a alguien que anhele el contacto humano, pero se le niega. Puede ser alguien que se encuentre solo o enojado, maloliente o sucio, con problemas mentales, prisionero de alguna manera, o viviendo solo sin un familiar o amigo con quien compartir. Sea cual sea su realidad, acércate con amor y compasión. Ofrece el toque humano que toda persona en la Tierra necesita para sobrevivir y prosperar.
